# Still standing and other lessons from sunflowers and the children at Bellavista School

Sunflowers are celebrated for their radiance. At school, we started the term with 'gorilla planting', each child receiving a small bag of sunflowers seeds to hurl onto random ground across Johannesburg. Before we set about spreading some brightness at a time that felt anything but cheerful, we considered some of the characteristics of these bright blooms.

Firstly, their towering stature, often reaching heights of up to two metres, commanding any observer's attention. They stand bold and unashamed. Secondly, the vibrant yellow petals flamboyantly surrounding the brown central disc create a striking visual contrast, symbolising warmth and positivity. These flowers can be as wide as thirty centimetres across the diameter. Additionally, sunflowers are known for heliotropism, a unique ability to *follow the sun* across the sky.

They are not soft nor fragile. Their robust stems and coarse leaves convey strength and durability, making them resilient in various environmental conditions. Sunflowers also attract pollinators, playing a crucial role in ecological diversity. Finally, their seeds, arranged at the flower's centre, are a rich source of nutrients and are cultivated for various culinary and nutritional purposes.

While sunflowers are generally resilient, they can be vulnerable to various factors that may impact their growth and survival. Excessive moisture can lead to root rot. Prolonged exposure to frost, especially during sensitive growth stages, can also be detrimental. Additionally, certain pests like aphids and caterpillars and pathogens like mildew and rust diseases may pose a threat and can cause a decline of sunflower health. In my case study of a vase of sunflowers while convalescing recently, I could not identify root rot, frost or pests. However, unnaturally, the flowers were in a vase without their usual environmental inputs. There was light, but not direct sunlight. They cheered me up for a week, and then fell over. One solitary stem reminded me that it is possible that even when under duress, I could be that sunflower still standing. It endured two more weeks, radiant and proud.

And so it is for you, *you are still standing. Standing* despite a(nother) hard year. *Standing* despite uncertainty, pressures, anxieties and loss. You are *standing* because you are resilient





like this extraordinary flower. Resilient, strong, outward looking, determined to find optimism. *You are standing* because, like sunflowers, you are waiting for the sun to rise again. And it will.

And so it is for your child. *Standing* despite the harsh realities of broad educational system. *Standing* with resilience although the pressures and frustrations of learning disabilities can loom. Commanding attention and embracing their strengths and weaknesses unashamedly. *Standing* for their values, from home and at school. *Standing* up for others with warmth and positivity. *Standing* as a source of encouragement and making society richer.

I don't know where all our seeds landed earlier this term, but I do know that the community of Bellavista School is a field of sunflowers, and it has impacted me personally in the period. To encourage me in my post op recovery, the children wrote cards, each touching and kind. The unelicited themes- grit; positivity; love; and care. Ten year olds turned my face to the sun. And I'm still standing.

It means soul. It cannot be explained in a physical way but rather metaphysical. When you walk into Bellavista you don't see it's soul, you feel it. Trevor, Max and Vincent welcome you and your kids everyday by name, with a smile and a positive energy. One cannot help but appreciate and smile at that greeting first thing in the morning. Not only has Bellavista given our child the tools and confidence he needed. But they have given the family the support and tools that we needed on this journey. Thank you for helping Nate see that there is no such thing as perfection but continued growth. That a mistake or a wrong answer does not mean the world will crumble. But an opportunity to learn. For learning to self-reflect, dig deep and know that he is enough. For listening to our bodies and finding ways to selfregulate. Well, our son has just headed off to write his final Exam of Grade 12, English Paper 2. What a journey this has been and we could not be more proud of the young man he has become and the commitment, self-discipline and determination he has developed and revealed to us all. It really makes me think back to where this journey really started. Eight years ago, we had very mixed and confused emotions about our son starting with Bellavista. I remember sitting in that first assembly of the year, thinking why here, why our son and why us? We could not understand what was happening and what was wrong. I know that I was really struggling to hold back from bursting out crying.

In no time, we started getting into the school rhythm and routines at Bellavista and knew we were in good hands. Exceptional hands. The three years our son spent at Bellavista were perhaps the best time of his life, and ours. He was carefree, having fun and being fulfilled. But behind that, there was a lot of work to get to the heart of where he was facing difficulties in class. And he developed some major super-powers along the way, through facing and taking on his own challenges. He is highly emotionally intelligent and empathetic towards others and will defend and pick up anyone who is brought or put down.
